Welcome to the 7th World Congress of Environmental and Resource Economists (WCERE) at the stunning oceanfront campus of NOVA School of Business and Economics in Carcavelos, Portugal! After a longer-than-expected wait, since the planned 2022 World Congress was cancelled due to the COVID-19 pandemic, we are thrilled to finally be reuniting as a global community of environmental and resource economists for five days of outstanding academic exchange and social events from 29 June to 3 July 2026.

This edition marks an important milestone for our field and our community. For the first time, the World Congress is co-organized by five regional associations – AERE, AAERE, AFAERE, EAERE, and LAERE – bringing genuine institutional representation from Africa and Latin America alongside Asia, Europe, and North America. We believe this broader foundation reflects both the global nature of the environmental challenges we study and the growing strength of environmental and resource economics as a truly worldwide discipline. Participants are expected from over 60 countries, and we warmly welcome everyone, whether attending your first WCERE or your seventh, whether an established scholar or an early-career researcher taking your first steps in our field.

The eight years since we last gathered in Gothenburg have been eventful for environmental economics. Biodiversity has moved up on the policy agenda. Climate policy has been tested, debated, and revised – and in some cases rolled back – and carbon markets have matured. Geopolitical shifts are reshaping global energy systems in ways that simultaneously complicate and intensify the sustainability transition, raising urgent questions about energy security, resource dependence, and the pace and politics of decarbonization that our field is well-placed to address. There is no shortage of important questions to bring to Carcavelos, and we look forward to five days of rich and wide-ranging discussion.

More than 1000 scientific papers will be presented across parallel sessions, alongside 28 policy sessions, 32 thematic sessions, and 43 egg-timer sessions. A distinguished plenary program and special policy events will complement the scientific sessions. The social program will offer ample opportunities to renew old friendships and forge new ones, something many of us have been looking forward to after such a long time.

WEIRD Is not enough for achieving regenerative ocean economies



Rashid Sumaila

University of British Columbia, Canada



Conventional economics in its mainstream and business-oriented form, has too often been guided by a narrow logic of short-term profit maximization, quarterly returns, and the relentless extraction of value from nature. I argue that this model, which may be described as WEIRD economics, shaped by assumptions rooted in Western, educated, industrialized, rich, and democratic (WEIRD) societies, is not enough to achieve regenerative ocean economies. The problem is not economic theory itself, but the form of economics that has become dominant, where success is measured mainly by immediate financial gain, living systems are treated as inputs, or commodities rather than as the ecological foundations of human wellbeing. In the case of the ocean, this logic has contributed to the overexploitation of fish stocks, the degradation of marine habitats, and the normalization of practices that undermine long-term resilience, e.g., bottom trawling. Here, I suggest ways to extend WEIRD economics with Indigenous and Granny wisdom to make it more fit for purpose.

Wednesday 1st of July 2026

Driving Restrictions: Lessons and Challenges from Over 50 Years of Experience



Juan-Pablo Montero

Pontificia Universidad Católica de Chile, Chile



This presentation reviews over fifty years of experience with driving restrictions, assessing when they reduce congestion and pollution and when they backfire. Drawing on evidence from Mexico City, Santiago, Bogotá, and Madrid, it shows that uniform license-plate restrictions can be counterproductive by encouraging purchases of second-hand polluting vehicles, delaying fleet renewal, or extending the life of older cars. By contrast, vintage-specific restrictions and low-emission zones can perform well when targeted at the most polluting vehicles and designed with long-run fleet responses in mind. Restrictions aimed at reducing congestion can also improve welfare when drivers can pay an exemption fee. The presentation emphasizes extensive versus intensive margins of adjustment, distributional impacts, and the role of commitment when “transition technologies”, such as hybrid vehicles, are temporarily exempted.

Energy Crises, Policy Responses, and Distributional Effect



Natalia Fabra

Center for Monetary and Financial Studies (CEMFI), Spain



Energy crises are becoming recurrent, requiring governments to understand the impact of their policy responses better. During the 2021–2023 crisis, most EU countries implemented costly downstream subsidies that strained public funds and distorted competition. Conversely, Spain and Portugal intervened in the wholesale market, decoupling electricity prices from gas. This "Iberian solution" significantly reduced consumer bills with minimal fiscal impact and positive distributional outcomes, albeit some distortion in electricity trade. This keynote will review analyses of these policy responses and examine preliminary evidence from the current crisis, where expanded renewable deployment is increasingly buffering economies against fossil fuel volatility. The discussion will highlight how policy design can harmonize economic efficiency with social equity during energy crisis periods.

Friday 3rd of July 2026

Do Economists Give Good Environmental Policy Advice? Externalities in Broader Economic Context



Lint Barrage

ETH Zurich, Switzerland



Economists' environmental policy advice is often based on efficiency-maximizing approaches in models of large, mature market economies with a single distortion – an environmental externality. In practice, the advice emerging from such frameworks – such as that climate change should be addressed by pricing carbon globally at the social cost of carbon – may require rethinking for several reasons. These include political economy and implementation constraints, distributional concerns, and, perhaps surprisingly, even efficiency considerations, as a growing body of work shows that policy recommendations can change qualitatively once environmental risks and policies interact with other empirically relevant frictions. Key examples range from innovation externalities and industrial linkages to informality in energy systems and overlapping pollutants. This talk will highlight recent work in this domain and suggest a broader research agenda on environmental policy design in richer economic settings.

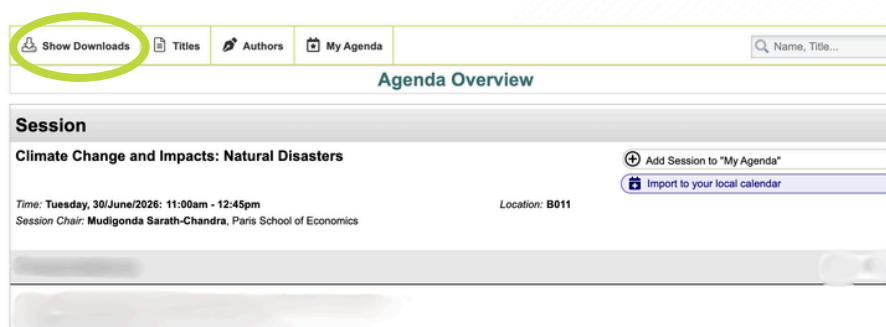

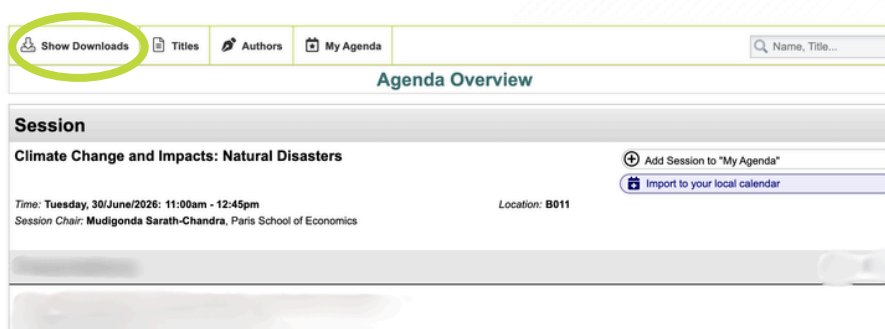

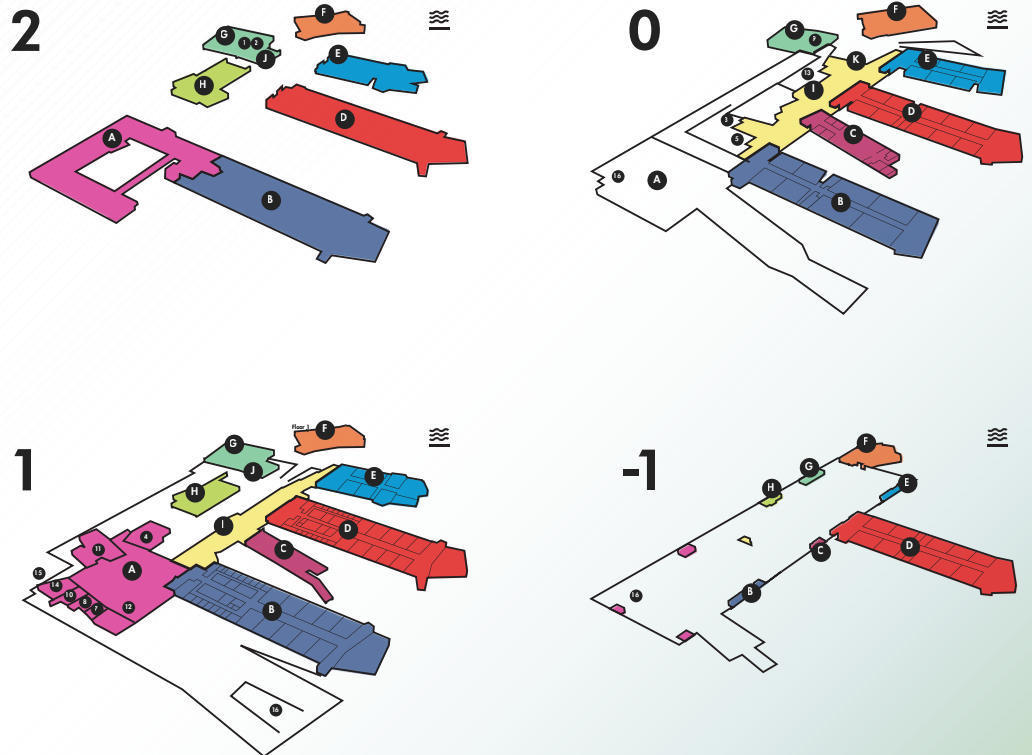

Crew

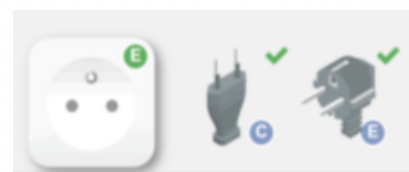

HOW TO GET TO NOVA SBE FROM LISBON, CASCAIS, OR ESTORIL

Train: The Carcavelos Campus is located halfway between Lisbon and Cascais. The best way to reach the campus from Lisbon, Cascais or Estoril is by train:

Train from Lisbon (Cais de Sodré) station to Oeiras or Carcavelos station - 18-20 minutes

Train from Cascais station to Carcavelos station - 13 minutes

Train from Estoril station to Carcavelos station - 9 minutes

Train frequency:

- Every 15 minutes during peak hours (7:00–10:00 a.m. and 5:00–8:30 p.m.)
- Every 20 minutes during off-peak times (10:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m.)
- Every 30 minutes between 5:30 am and 7am and after 9:30pm and 1:30am

RAIL REPLACEMENT BUS

It is important to note there are free rail replacement buses between Caxias and Cascais train stations, starting from 21:30 going from Cais Do Sodré to Cascais, and starting from 22:00 starting from Cascais to Cais do Sodré. The rail replacement service will end between 02:10 -02:52 a.m. depending on which direction you are traveling in. These rail replacement buses can be easily found outside of Caxias and Cascais train stations. A member of the CP train staff will be present to guide you to your correct bus.

HOW TO GET TO NOVA SBE FROM CARCAVELOS STATION

The distance between Carcavelos Station and Nova SBE is approximately 1.5 km. You can reach the campus by:

OVERVIEW

The Faculty of Economics and Business, Universitas Indonesia (FEB UI) traces its roots to Indonesia's early post-independence years.
